10 GOLDEN RULES OF GOLF

If all golfers were to learn these 10 Golden Rules, it is estimated that they may be able to resolve 90% of the Rules situations that golfers routinely encounter in the course of an 18-hole round.

These are some of the most basic principles of the game:

- 1. Play the ball as it lies.
- 2. Do NOT move, bend, *or* break anything growing *or* fixed, *except* in fairly taking your stance *or* swing. Do NOT press anything down.
- 3. You may lift "natural" objects NOT fixed *or* growing, *except* in a water hazard *or* bunker. NO penalty.
- 4. <u>Movable</u> man-made objects may be moved. For <u>immovable</u> objects, you may take relief by dropping away from them within one club-length of the nearest point of relief, no nearer the hole, *except* in a water hazard *or* if the object <u>defines</u> out of bounds. In a <u>bunker</u>, you <u>must drop</u> in the <u>bunker</u>. NO penalty.
- 5. You may take relief from casual water, ground under repair, burrowing animal holes or casts, anywhere except in a water hazard. On the putting green, place at the nearest point of relief, no nearer the hole; otherwise drop within one clublength of the nearest point of relief, no nearer the hole. In a bunker, you MUST drop in the bunker. NO penalty.
- 6. In a water hazard or bunker, do NOT touch the water or ground with your hand or club before the stroke.
- 7. If you hit your ball into a water hazard and CANNOT find or play it, either drop at the place where you played the previous shot, or drop behind the point where the ball last crossed the

hazard margin ("FLAG LINE"). On the tee, you may tee the ball. One penalty stroke.

If you hit into a lateral water hazard, you may also drop within two club-lengths of the point where the ball last crossed the hazard margin, *or*, within two club-lengths of a point equidistant from the hole on the opposite margin. One penalty stroke.

- 8. When you hit your ball OB or CANNOT find it after 5 minutes of searching (lost ball), add a penalty stroke, go back and drop a ball at the place where you played the previous shot. On the tee, you may tee the ball. If you think you have hit your ball OB or lost it outside a water hazard, play a provisional ball before searching for the first one.
- 9. When you have an <u>unplayable lie</u>, (a) you may drop a ball at the place where you played the previous shot, adding a penalty stroke. On the tee, you may tee the ball. Alternatively, (b) drop any distance behind the unplayable spot, keeping it between you and the hole ("FLAG LINE"), or (c) drop within two club-lengths, no nearer the hole. If the ball is in a bunker, you MUST drop in the bunker, under either of the alternative options. You MAY NOT declare your ball <u>unplayable</u> that is in a water hazard, see Golden Rule #7.
- 10. You may repair <u>ball marks</u> and <u>old hole plugs</u> that are on the <u>putting green</u> that are on the line of your putt, but not spike marks.

This list omits one of the Rules that is often breached in amateur golf and that is purposely touching a ball in play, such as in identifying a ball in the rough. This often happens when a ball lies in long grass and the player wants to ensure that it is theirs before they make a stroke at it. Instead of following the procedure set down in Rule 12-2 they bend down and rotate their ball until they can see their identification mark or the brand and number that they are playing. This action incurs a penalty of one stroke. A player may NOT touch their ball in

these circumstances *unless* they announce their intention to their opponent(s) in match play, *or* marker *or* fellow-competitor in stroke play, *and* then mark the position of their ball *before* touching it. The player MUST mark the position of their ball to avoid a penalty even if they do NOT actually lift the ball when they touch it (Decision 12-2/2).

Note: There is NO penalty when a player <u>accidentally touches</u> their ball while removing a loose impediment lying close to it, providing the ball does NOT move (Decision 18-2a/31).

Of course, a ball at rest on a putting green may be lifted and cleaned without notifying anyone else, but again it MUST be marked first. If a player rotates their ball on the putting green to line-up the trademark with the hole, without marking it, they still incur the one stroke penalty for touching the ball other than as provided for in Rule 18-2a. Under Rules 16-1b and 20-1, a ball on the putting green may be lifted (or touched and rotated) only after its position has been marked (Decision 18-2a/33).

You will sometimes hear golfers claim that touching a ball with the club-head incurs a penalty. This is NOT correct. *Providing* the ball does NOT move there is nothing in the Rules to prohibit this. In fact, Decision 13-4/12 confirms that even in a bunker or water hazard there is no penalty if a player accidentally touches their ball with their club-head, providing it does NOT move.
